Legislative Updates

The 2023 Florida Legislature passed House Bill 1537, which became Chapter 2023-39, Laws of Florida, upon the approval of Governor DeSantis on May 9, 2023. Included in the bill are the following modifications to initial eligibility requirements necessary for students to qualify for a Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program award that became effective July 1, 2023:

- Permits students to combine volunteer service and paid work hours;
- Authorizes students to earn a concordant score on the Classic Learning Test (CLT) to meet the minimum test score requirement; and
- Revises the list of courses that receive additional weights for the purpose of calculating students' grade point averages (GPA) for Bright Futures purposes.

Service Hour Requirement

Effective July 1, 2023, students graduating in the 2022-23 academic year and thereafter may satisfy the service hour requirement for a specific Bright Futures program by completing the statutory required number of volunteer service hours, 100 paid work hours, or a combination of both. The combination of volunteer service hours and paid work hours must equal a minimum of 100 total hours to fulfill the service hour requirement. Eligible paid work hours completed on or after June 27, 2022, may be included. Please ensure that all completed hours are included on student transcripts.

Students must complete a program of volunteer service, paid work, or a combination of both as approved by the district school board or the administrators of a nonpublic school. Each district school board and the administrators of a nonpublic school must establish approved activities and the process for the documentation of volunteer service or paid work hours including the deadline by which they must be completed. The student may identify a social or civic issue or a professional area that interests them and develop a plan for their personal involvement in addressing the issue or learning about the area. The student must, through papers or other presentations, evaluate and reflect upon their volunteer service or paid work experience. Volunteer service or paid work may include, but is not limited to, a business or governmental internship, work for a nonprofit community service organization, or activities on behalf of a candidate for public office. The hours of volunteer service or paid work must be documented in writing, and the document must be signed by the student, the student's parent or guardian, and a representative of the organization for which the student performed the volunteer service or paid work.

Bright Futures Student Handbook

At the beginning of each fall term, the Office of Student Financial Assistance (OSFA) updates the Bright Futures Student Handbook. Please be sure to review the handbook each year prior to the beginning of the school year so you are aware of any changes. [Chapter 1](#) provides an overview of the requirements to qualify for an award. [Chapter 2](#) provides information to students about their award at a postsecondary institution, including the award amounts. [Chapter 3](#) provides information on how to maintain scholarship eligibility.

“Clean Slate”

The “Clean Slate” process for public schools consists of the following:

- Prior to receiving 2023-24 and 2024-25 transcripts, OSFA will delete all junior and senior transcripts from our database.
- The district/school will be required to submit new transcripts for all enrolled juniors and seniors after **September 1, 2023**.

Benefits of the “Clean Slate” approach include:

- The list of seniors will only include enrolled students that reported during the current year;
- Transcripts submitted for seniors will have current demographic information; and
- First transcript submissions for seniors will not have a Bright Futures matching issue (e.g., B01, B02 and B09) as there will not be any prior year records to match against.

2023-24 Early Evaluation Processing

Submit Early Evaluation transcripts within 30 days of the end of the first semester. For each senior, include 7th semester grades, courses in progress for the 8th semester, and volunteer service hours and paid work hours earned during high school through January 31, 2024. OSFA will obtain official ACT[®], CLT[®], and SAT[®] test scores for tests taken through January 31, 2024. Please review each transcript for accuracy. OSFA will communicate with our Bright Futures district and school contacts when award notifications begin to post to students' online accounts in spring 2024.

NOTE: The FASTER address value for Early Evaluation 2024 senior transcripts is 2471.

Qualifying Test Scores

Students will be evaluated based on official test scores received from the Florida Department of Education (FDOE) Test Repository. Please remind students, at the time of each test registration, to send scores from single test sittings (not a superscore) to a Florida public university. To assist with the repository confirmation, students must ensure all demographic information and their current address is accurate on each ACT[®], CLT[®], or SAT[®] test registration and the student transcript. Test scores from exams taken no later than August 31 of the student's graduation year will be accepted. Test scores for the 2023-24 graduates include:

- Florida Academic Scholars (FAS) – minimum ACT[®] composite score of 29, minimum CLT[®] overall score of 96, or minimum SAT[®] combined score of 1340.
- Florida Medallion Scholars (FMS) – minimum ACT[®] composite score of 25, minimum CLT[®] overall score of 84, or minimum SAT[®] combined score of 1210.

Mid-Year Evaluations

Mid-Year graduates are those students who:

- Graduate mid-way through the 2023-24 year (September 1, 2023, through January 31, 2024);
- File the *Florida Financial Aid Application* no later than December 31, 2023; and
- Plan to enroll and receive funding at a postsecondary institution in spring 2024.

Submit transcripts for Mid-Year graduates in fall 2023 so Early Evaluations may be processed.

NOTE: The FASTER address value for 2023-24 Mid-Year graduate transcripts is 2471.

Florida Financial Aid Application (FFAA)

To be considered for a Bright Futures scholarship, current high school seniors are required to apply for the program by submitting the *2024-25 Florida Financial Aid Application* (FFAA) that opens October 1, 2023. Students who wish to be evaluated for a scholarship must submit a completed FFAA during the last year in high school, beginning October 1, 2023, and no later than August 31, 2024.

Encourage all high school seniors to file the FFAA even if they are currently planning to attend an out-of-state postsecondary institution or who may qualify for other state scholarship and grant programs. Students who do not complete an application will forfeit their eligibility for a Bright Futures scholarship.

Coursework Requirements

Program requirements for Florida Academic Scholars (FAS) and Florida Medallion Scholars (FMS) follow the State University System (SUS) admissions requirements as outlined in Florida Board of Governors Regulation 6.002, Admission of Undergraduate First-Time-in-College, Degree-Seeking Freshmen. The official final evaluation for a Gold Seal Vocational (GSV) scholarship is based upon a student satisfying all GSV requirements with completed transcript fields: DIPLOMA TYPE Standard and valid GRADUATION DATE. The Gold Seal CAPE (GSC) scholarship requires a minimum of five postsecondary credit hours through CAPE industry certifications that articulate for college credit.

Bright Futures Course Table (BFCT)

Use the BFCT in conjunction with the resources provided for counselors on the BFCT home screen at <https://sso.osfaffelp.org/BFIEHS/Course/ComprehensiveCourse>. Users will find links on the BFCT to resources that provide comprehensive information concerning coursework approved in the state and how courses are used for various purposes, including high school graduation. Counselors should use those resources to advise students. Please review information provided in the [Florida Counseling for Future Education Handbook](#) under the appendix “High School Special Case Course Equivalencies.” The Bright Futures office will refer any counselor question concerning a course to our BFCT partners, the Office of Articulation, Workforce, or the Board of Governors.
